After 34 months, and as many articles, coming up with new ideas becomes more and more difficult. As I sat musing about what to write about this month, **Marcia** happened to stop by after her Pilates class, and I started to grouse about my writer's block. Being the lovely and intelligent wife that she is, she says, "Why not write about what Del Rey Yacht Club offers to the community?" As I started to contemplate this topic, I realized we offer quite a lot.

Our Anglers committee, chaired by **Dir. Vic Jedlicka**, has, over the years, provided several thousands of dollars in educational equipment to the Little Red School House at the Isthmus.

Our Community Outreach committee, chaired by **Sue Artof**, and ably assisted by **Irv Weinhaus**, sponsors fishing trips for inner city youth, blind children and other at-risk kids. Approximately 1,000 children per year benefit from this program. Between 20 and 30 of our members assist as mentors on these fishing trips. This committee has also provided harbor cruises for wounded veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan. In conjunction with this program, our Sail/Racing committees chaired by **Sterling Tallman** and **Tucker Strasser** treat these "wounded warriors" to a free BBQ dinner on the Aft Deck after the Friday night races. Other Outreach activities have included trips to the Catalina Science Center for at-risk kids and a Teacher Award Program, where members volunteered their boats to entertain teachers being honored for excellence in teaching.

Our Race/Sail Committee does much more, too. They have helped host several community events, including a Crew Tryout which introduced new racers to racing and race boats, the "North U Seminar" which was an all-day sail trim class and a US Sailing Judges Seminar. Member **Roberto Cordero** heads up the ASMBYC Buoy Committee which is responsible for keeping the racing buoys maintained for all clubs to use. Member **Earnie Barker** uses the *DRY-C* whenever needed to set the replacement buoys, as well. **Earnie** also goes out on the *DRY-C* to run races as a committee boat for any club that has lost their boat.

The Junior program, directed by **Virginia Howard**, contributes quite heavily to our Public Service Program. This is because traditionally the number of non-member children is 60% or more compared to member children in attendance.

The DRYC Auxiliary provides scholarships for 2 kids to attend our Junior's sailing program. Additional activities include knitting scarves for Operation Gratitude, cooking and serving monthly meals at the Ocean Park Community Center, collecting clothes for the homeless, collecting Toys for Tots and running the kids' program at the Catalina 4<sup>th</sup> of July affair.

Other contributions include donations to the Recreational Boaters of California (RBOC) as well as the Catalina Hyperbaric chamber and the USC Wrigley Institute. In addition, DRYC donates the use of rooms for periodic meetings for the Sheriff's Department, Beaches and Harbors, Santa Monica Bay Restoration Committee and regular weekly meetings for 2 US Coast Guard Flotillas.

We also have members like **Ella Zarky** who are responsible for overseeing the Auxiliary SOVA collections, and **Paula Bertik** who sees that donated cell phones are given to shelters to help battered women and who along with her husband, **Allen**, works tirelessly for the USO.

There is no doubt in my mind that I have omitted others who quietly work behind the scenes and of whom I am simply unaware. We as members of DRYC should be immensely proud of what our Club and its members give back to our community. We really are a great Club with a big heart. Keep it up, DRYC!







This Fall will be one of the best times to cruise; the weather is normally conducive to both sailing and motor boating and the islands are less crowded. If you did not use your yacht enough during the summer, now is your chance to break away and get away.

#### FUEL- SAVING TIPS;

Slow down to hull speed (7-9kts) and cut fuel burn up to 50% Watch your wake, do not dig a hole. Trim your boat to near level. Keep bottom and running gear clean of barnacles and grass. Do not run with full fuel, water, bait and holding tanks to reduce weight. Reduce more weight by removing unnecessary stuff from boat. Have your props checked for dings and correct pitch to max the RPM's. Travel with the wind and current at your back, if possible. Keep engines tuned, change oil and clean your air filters.

Use the NAV function on your GPS/Auto pilot to steer a straighter course.

Making sure all the members have fun is the priority, but there are so many little things (and big things) in which a Cruise Chair must think about and plan for. But, you get to work with all the great people in the Front Office and Maintenance – just another reason to take on this important position. Food for thought for next year! Also this month, we plan for the General Membership Meeting on the 12th, where the Club begins its three month journey for Board Director and Officer Elections. For those of you who celebrate the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur high holy days, please let me wish you a happy new year and quick and safe fast. The Club will host its annual Rosh Hashanah dinner, so please look for the flyer on this and make your reservations soon!

Be forewarned that there may be traffic delays on Admiralty Way in the fall as crews resurface the street and sidewalks. Repairs are scheduled to begin Sept. 4<sup>th</sup> and last about ten weeks, closing two lanes at a time on Admiralty Way from Via Regatta to about 800 feet east of Palawan Way, approximately where Killer Shrimp is located. For the first four weeks of the project, the two westbound lanes will be closed, forcing motorists to merge onto one oncoming lane, and vice versa for the following four weeks. Road closure will be 24-hours a day except for the last two weeks, when workers will be restoring the median and impacting drivers from about 8:30 AM to 6:30 PM. No left hand turns will be allowed along the route, but westbound drivers will be allowed to u-turn at Palawan Way to access the businesses on the south side of Admiralty Way.

#### SAIL COMMITTEE

On Saturday, June 23rd, Del Rey Yacht Club ran the 37th annual One More Time Regatta for wooden hulled Sailboats. The event was co-sponsored by the Wooden Hull Yacht Club and Pacific Mariners' Yacht Club. This is the only wooden hulled boat race regularly held in Santa Monica Bay.

The sun came out after days of gloom and the wind Gods showed up in the form of Southwesterlies from 11 to 17 knots with three to six foot seas. The conditions were picture-perfect for these vessels and the race was over before four o'clock.

Fourteen boats showed up for this race ranging from 34 foot *Rogues' March*, a 1985 Herreshoff Cutter to *Rose of Sharon*, a 59 foot schooner built in 1930, and *Bequia*, a 41 foot custom cutter originally built for singer Bob Dylan.

*Bequia* was the overall winner, having rounded the 13.5 NM course in two hours twenty two minutes and change. She was followed by *Destiny*, Jim Cash's 39 foot 1938 Atkins Yawl. The red hulled beauty had just undergone a complete restoration and did very well, losing to *Bequia* by an adjusted time of eleven seconds.

Patience, a 36 foot Herreshoff Ketch, sailed by Dennis Jensch assisted by 86 year old owner Denton Porter took third overall. Patience won the event in 2007 and 2008.

La Volpe and skipper Tim O'Brien took forth overall and first in schooner class, beating *Rose of Sharon* by thirty-three seconds. The 1924 schooner was at the guest dock and provided a dazzling example of wooden boat restoration.

*Pacifica*, the 51 foot Sparkman and Stephens Yawl and skipper Doug Jones finished sixth. *Pacifica* was originally built in 1947.

The conditions favored cruising designs with split-rigged boats and cutters taking the first eight finishes.

There was a Friday night Sundown-style BBQ and trophy presentation after the race and this was thoroughly enjoyed by all the participants.

There was a special presentation to **Commodore Jim Gould** - a picture signed by all the skippers who participated.

Many thanks go out to **Judy Gavin**, **Earnie Barker**, **Rich Cincinelli**, and **Janet Bubar-Rich** for performing race committee chores on a pitching, rolling platform, and helping with food service afterward; **Sterling Tallman** ran a faultless BBQ; **Vivian Callahan** for photos and tending the beer and wine bar; **Joe Goodman** and Marla Brown for taking tickets for food and drinks; and Alice Weston for setting up and tending bar and food service.

Bent Thomsen and the food and beverage staff did a fantastic job despite last minute requests-thank you.

Thanks to Lynne, Lisa, Archie and Max at the front office for coordinating slips, sailing instructions, setting up the patio and other logistical items too numerous to list.

This is the second race of the California Classic Yacht Series and as such we can expect the fleet size to grow. Del Rey Yacht Club and its members once again have risen to the task.

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





The book under discussion this month was ABRAHAM'S CHILDREN, RACE, IDENTITY AND THE DNA



OF THE CHOSEN PEOPLE, by Jon Entine, which set forth new information based on DNA evidence by which many who identified themselves as Jews could trace their ancestry back to ancient times. Various DNA markers can now identify not only diseases which have been passed down through family blood lines, but also markers for various tribal affiliations, such as if a person were a member of the priest class of ancient Israel, a Cohen for example. DNA proved the closeness

of Jews to the Italians and other peoples of the Mediterranean, since Jews once made up ten percent of the Roman Empire. The author also delved into whether various people who identify themselves as Jews are actually descendants of the ancient Israelites, such as the falasha of Ethiopia, who actually have no DNA markers that would prove this contention. Most interesting were individuals in the American Southwest who discovered that they had Jewish ancestry, which had been concealed for centuries because of the Spanish Inquisition.

The book was difficult going for many members because of the technical nature of some of the writing, while others enjoyed the read. An argument was made that instead of human ancestry being grouped into three races, Caucasian, African and Asian, that we look at it from the point of view of a person's extended family going back in time with all the admixtures from various effects such as inter-marriage, warfare, migrations, etc, this being especially true for the Ashkenazi population of Eastern Europe which has both DNA stemming from ancient Israel mixed with those of the Khazars and many other peoples.

Countering this was the argument that it was culture more than ancestry that determines a person's identity. Who you are depends less on your DNA, than specific environmental factors such as self-identification and group allegiance. The question was asked: with inter-marriage so prevalent in the Jewish community, with what means will we identify Jews of the future?

Our next read is A CONSPIRACY OF PAPER, by



David Liss, an Edgar winning novel, involving a rakish Jewish boxer in the 18th century who must solve an important mystery.



#### **FLEET SURGEON**

The first tenet of yachting is to keep the water outside of the boat. I thought about this the other day as I was standing in front of a urinal in one of our newly redecorated restrooms. Seemed like a natural segue to talk about urine.

Urine is a wonderful product of the body. It removes excess water and the wastes that are filtered out of the blood by the kidneys. On our boats we are always checking the status of things by how they look, how much or less something is, how it smells, how it feels and so on. We can do the same with our urine.

First, let's talk color. The color of urine runs the gamut from clear pale yellow to deep amber. The color comes from a natural pigment in the urine called urochrome. (How creative!) The more dilute the urine, the lighter the color. The more concentrated the urine, the darker the color. You've probably heard the recommendation to drink 6-8 glasses of water a day. I have a hard time remembering what I've had for breakfast, so it's an impossible task to keep a running tally on glasses of water. This is made all the more confusing by challenging yourself with such questions as, "Does a can of Coke or a cup of coffee count as a glass of water?" "What about a bowl of soup?" I've given up on counting and gone over to the method of drinking enough fluid so that my urine remains almost clear or slightly pale yellow. This is so much easier. Remember that caffeine and alcohol are diuretics. They will make you urinate more and potentially cause you to become somewhat dehydrated. In these cases you need to take in more fluids just as you would when it's hot (Sweating causes loss of water.) or at high altitude. (Lower atmospheric pressure causes water molecules to escape more easily through the skin.)

The color can also be outside of the yellow to amber spectrum. Blood can turn urine shades of red and always raises the suspicion of kidney or bladder cancer. One morning, years ago, I saw pink in the toilet bowl. I immediately cancelled my appointments for the day, demanded an emergency visit to an urologist, and almost killed myself and others driving madly to his office. I filled the sample cup with pink liquid and awaited the recommendation to get my affairs in order. The doctor came into the room and said there was no blood. He then asked me if I had beets for dinner. I never eat beets, but did indeed have some the night before. His next question was, "Excuse me, but what type of doctor are you?" (I must have been sick that day in medical school). Actually, there are many things that can change the color of urine. Strenuous exercise can cause small amounts of blood to be excreted into the urine. (I tried to use this as an excuse with Jessica to get out of going to the gym. Her reply was, "Show me some blood and then we'll talk!"). When pain accompanies the pink color, it could be an infection or kidney stones. Foods such as beets, berries, fava beans and rhubarb can give urine a red hue. Medications such as pyridium (used for urinary tract infections) and laxatives containing senna go to the orange. Dyes in medications, vitamins and supplements create colors across the rainbow. All of these present no risk or need for concern and the urine should return to its usual color within a day of stopping the culprit. If the color persists, especially if accompanied by discomfort, pain or unusual odors, consult your physician.

So from now on, check your oil, check your filters and check your urine - it's ok to look!

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
